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

A postmodern cut-up novel in the vein of William S. Burroughs, Brion Gysin, and the Situationists. Early works by Acker in complete runs are scarce, as they were often issued in parts, either handed out to friends or sold by subscription.

Originally published anonymously in 1824 to little notice, Hogg's novel first achieved wide recognition seven decades later with this unexpurgated edition. Recently reissued by the New York Review of Books as *The Private Memoirs and Confessions of a Justified Sinner*.
