Very Good with faint damp staining throughout, front wrap corner creased, slight cock to spine. A scarce variant, perhaps the earliest state, of the only Fitzgerald title to appear in advance form.

Variant ARC unrecorded by Matthew Bruccoli in F. Scott Fitzgerald: A Bibliography. He only records copies bound in wrappers made from a dust jacket trimmed to size, stating "These are the most collectible copies of Tender is the *Night* in terms of priority and rarity." In F. Scott Fitzgerald and the Marketplace Bruccoli speculates that the reason for their scarcity is that the vast majority of ARCs were bound in cloth by the publisher and sold as trade copies. The text block of our variant copy is about an eighth of an inch shorter than the published book; the brown wrappers are clearly integral with no indication of a jacket ever having been mounted to them. This is very well may be an earlier state of the ARC than that which Bruccoli describes, prepared perhaps before the jacket design was complete.









As with all James' work (be it literary criticism or political polemic), his genuine concern for the thoughts and inner lives of everyday people is evident. One of the first major works of literature from the Caribbean and an important, though often-overlooked proletarian novel.







The *One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest* author's hand marbled copies of his own later works. According his son Zane, Ken began experimenting with marbling techniques in 1964 while traveling on the bus FURTHUR and dropping acid for the first time. Oil paint floating in a puddle entranced the Merry Pranksters and they began dipping objects into the mixture, creating instant *objet d'art*. Later in his life Kesey returned to this technique, psychedelically marbling, finishing, and signing around 15-20 books total. Here are three of them, each a unique piece of original psychedelic art from the countercultural icon.

The handwritten manuscript of a historical novel set in China, with penciled and inked edits and corrections throughout in the author's hand. Among the edits are the author's decision to abandon a false "editorial" role in favor of outright authorship. Tipped in at the front are three pages of correspondence from March 1923 from the author in



Concord, Massachusetts to screenwriter Albert "Bert" S. LeVino, discussing aspects of the manuscript, including N.C. Wyeth's plans to paint color plates for the first edition.

Samuel Merwin, Sr. (1874-1936) was an American playwright and author. After attending Northwestern University, he worked between 1905 and 1911 as associate editor and then



editor of Success magazine. In 1907 the magazine sent him to China to investigate the opium trade. His novels and stories were often historical, romantic, war-themed, and/or set in the Far East, often with feminist themes. The first edition of Silk was published in 1923 by Houghton Mifflin, illustrated with color plates by N.C. Wyeth. It would be reprinted during the 1940s in the UK as a Penguin paperback.



Her linocut illustrations, which received renewed attention with a Fantagraphics collection in 2012, are very prominent in the 1944 & 1945 volumes, making up the endpapers of the latter and heading its every chapter. There are also numerous photos of her in her various endeavors as editor of *The Corinthian* (GSCW's literary quarterly), and participant in the yearbook committee, the International Relations Club, the Town Girls' Club (for student relations) and the Newman Club (for Catholic students). A showcase of her formidable creativity and personality in context.

Very Good with soiling to covers and light wear, various notes in margins and underlining as is typical with a yearbook. Includes tipped-in note on a clipped square of wrapping paper, "For Herman[,] Happy New Year from the O'Connors," which is quite possibly in the hand of Regina O'Connor, mother of the famous writer.

A fantastic association copy, inscribed by Jim Carroll to poets Ted Berrigan and his wife Alice Notley, "To Ted + Alice, 'I'll be right there'... All my love, Jim 10/7/78." Berrigan was a central figure in the second generation of the New York School of Poets. While teaching at St. Mark's Poetry Project in the Bowery, Berrigan took a very young Carroll under his wing, introducing him to figures such as William S. Burroughs and Jack Kerouac. A blurb on the rear cover supplied by Kerouac reads, "At 13 years of age, Jim Carroll writes better than 89% of the novelists working today."

Berrigan made his admiration of Carroll known, dedicating several of his poems to him, and publishing an article entitled "Jim Carroll" in a 1969 issue the journal Culture Hero, heaping high

> praise, exclaiming "Jim Carroll has to be the biggest thing arriving in heroic culture right now."

Very Good with spine lean, creases to spine and covers, stain to text block edge occasionally affecting margins, light scuffs to half-title page, several page corners creased. Carroll's best-known work, inscribed to his mentor and major figure in New York poetry, in the year of publication.

While at the press, Frost met Ezra Pound, who offered to write a review of it, which greatly built Frost's reputation and stature. Pound soon introduced Frost to W. B. Yeats, who considered this book "the best poetry written in America in a long time." A lovely copy of what marks the start of an illustrious career, in which Frost would win four Pulitzer Prizes.




